### Catholic Detention Ministry - Diocese of Orange Philosophy and Goals

Catholic Detention Ministry (CDM) responds to the Gospel mandate to visit the imprisoned. Detention ministers focus on the spiritual care of prisoners as well providing the best possible religious activities within a Christian setting. CDM's mission is to communicate the Good News of God's unconditional love to those incarcerated. CDM affirms each person, not necessarily their behavior, and invites them to grow as sons and daughters of God. Detention ministers recognize their own call to deeper conversion as well through their ministry. The works begins at the institution but extends to the church outside. Catholic Detention Ministry recognizes a responsibility to educate those who have not experienced the offender as a valuable individual.

**Services Provided:** The detention ministers serve as liturgical leaders, facilitators, and spiritual mentors. They serve as a powerful symbol of faith and God's presence in an otherwise dehumanizing environment. This pastoral presence enables reflection on the multiple life and death issues that often lead to jail and prison. CDM provides the following activities: Liturgical Services, Bible Study/Faith Enrichment, One on One Pastoral Visitation, Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession), Retreats and Days of Reflection, and Holy Day Activities.




Sylvia Puentes has a special heart for our youth and has ministered to those in juvenile hall for many years.
